Inside the Classroom: Why Teachers Love Group Work

Ever wondered why your teachers insist on putting you in groups? We dug a little deeper to find out why teachers use group work.

Teachers say group work isn't just a way to fill the lesson plan—it's a tool to build essential skills. By working together, students learn to communicate clearly, share ideas, and solve problems as a team. According to staff, it also encourages active participation, pushing quieter students to contribute confident and students to listen.



But it's not all about soft skills. Group tasks can help students tackle challenging topics, as peers often explain concepts in ways that make more sense than textbooks alone. Teachers also use it to spot misunderstandings early, so no one falls behind.

In our recent Enrichment Day, we interviewed Mrs Irwin, Literacy Coordinator for her thoughts. She helped explain, 'Firstly, when you work in a group, it improves your communication skills, particularly for young people who spend a lot of time isolated behind a screen.'

She continued, 'Probably the most underrated skill is our active listening when we are working in a team, it is not just about us, it is not the "I" it is the "we" and you have to actively listen in order to learn from others!'

Tasty Success!

Nothing brings people together like freshly baked muffins! On Enrichment Day, students whipped up delicious banana and chocolate muffins — a perfect blend of comfort and sweetness to brighten everyone's day.

275g self-rising flour 1 tsp baking soda 1 egg 2 bananas 50ml milk 125g caster sugar 75ml oil 50g chocolate chips 1.Preheat oven to 180°C.

2. Weigh out all dry ingredients and place into mixing bowl.

3.Peel and mash bananas with fork on a plate.

4.Weigh out all wet ingredients and place in second bowl, whisk together.

5. Combine wet with dry ingredients and add chocolate chips. Mix gently.

6.Place muffin cases into bun tray & spoon mixture evenly into cases.

7. Bake for 15 -20 minutes until well risen and golden brown. Place on a cooling rack.




Hair at No.5: Tips, Tricks, and Talent ent Day at Clounagh The fun didn't stop with

Meet the Dynamic Duo Behind the Scenes!

We sat down with Mrs Farr, Science Technician, and Mr Farr, Building Supervisor, a married couple who play key roles in keeping the science labs running and the school building in top shape.



Mr Farr:

Q: What does a typical day look like for you?

A: Opening up first thing in the morning, cleaning up, making repairs, doing tuck shop and locking up the school at the end of the day.

Q: What are some of the biggest challenges you face in your role?

A: I would say financial restraints and getting work done as budgets are tight at the minute.

Q: How has the school changed since you started working here? **A:** There have been 3 extensions added, such as the Technology corridor, the Art room and the music corridor. Also ICT has been greatly improved.


Q: If you could have any superpower to help with your job, what would it be?

A: The ability to see into the future so I can see what's going to happen before it's going to happen.

Mrs Farr:

Q: Can you describe what a typical day as a science technician looks like?

A: Extremely busy, always up and down the corridors because I have two classes up stairs and two downstairs. Everyday's different but it's always busy.



A: We did a marshmallow experiment with a really dangerous salt chemical that explodes when you put water in it.



Q: What do students or teachers often not realise about your job? A: All the prep behind it and all the clean up like the heart dissections, I have to prepare the hearts and then when everyone is finished I have to go and clean up after everybody.

Q: What did you do before you were a Science Technician in Clounagh?

A: I was a swimming instructor and I still am, so I did that for about three years. I also taught a few people in school as well!

Q: Have you ever had a science experiment go wrong — and how did you handle it?

A: None, because I'm such a good science technician and always well prepped!

From Notes to Knowledge: Flashcards in Action

As exams approach, finding effective ways to revise is more important than ever. One popular method that students and staff are raving about is using flashcards.

Often students question teachers about why exams are so important. Mrs Patterson, Curriculum Vice Principal. explained, **'Exams** are important because it gives us a measure of what's been learnt. It allows young people to show themselves in the best light and look and see how they are going to progress. It has to be a way we assess, you get a result and then we move on from there.'





Mrs Patterson also mentioned the biggest mistakes students make in revision are 'Re-reading or highlighting, cramming, not taking anything in and going over what they already know instead of the difficult material.'

To help students with their revision, in September, Mrs Bridge led workshops on how to use Flashcards as a revision technique. Flashcards are small cards used to help you remember information. On one side, you write a question or

a keyword, on the other side you write the answer. They are a quick, hands on way to test your memory and to get key information into your head.

Many students find flashcards helpful because they turn revision into an interactive and active learning process. You can shuffle them, quiz yourself, or even test a friend, making study time more engaging. For example:





Mrs Bridge reported, 'Flashcards make revision really active, so that instead of just reading notes you quiz yourself and this helps your brain to remember things for longer. They are also great for spotting what you know well and what you need to work on. We even use the Traffic Light system in Clounagh so it's clear which information you know well and which you need to work on.'

In conclusion, flashcards are a simple yet powerful tool for revision. By promoting active recall and spaced repetition, they help students retain information



more effectively and boost confidence ahead of exams.

Whether used for vocabulary, formulas, or key concepts, incorporating flashcards into your study routine can transform learning from a passive task into an engaging, interactive preparation not only more efficient but also more rewarding.
