Reflection of the 2021/22 Academic Year

It is hard to believe that it was 18 March 2020 when the First and Deputy First Minister announced that as of 20 March schools would close due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Well, a lot happened since then; we have had remote learning via Google Classroom, GCSE and A Level grades awarded via Centre Determine Grades and Teacher Professional Judgements, one way systems, class bubbles, Lateral Flow Testing, self-isolation, Track and Trace and the vaccination programme. At the start of the academic year, we were all hopeful that this school year would be as normal as possible but unfortunately this wasn't to be the case, as during the Autumn and Winter terms we continued to witness significant disruption. Thankfully the Spring and Summer terms have been much more settled and our 'new normal', while not perfect, has been welcomed.

I continued to be so impressed by the entire school community, the resilience of our pupils to meet every challenge put in front of them, parents who have encouraged and supported their children through this most difficult time and of course the outstanding commitment of the staff within our school.

The pupils have been excellent throughout and have settled well into the 'new normal'. Key Stage 3 pupils have engaged with the reset and conduct curriculum which aims to restore the high standards of behaviour, uniform, work ethic and standards which are expected. The pupils in the key examination years have been outstanding in their work ethic while completing course work and preparing for their external exams. Many of our Year 12s are returning to Sixth Form, whilst some, along with our Year 14s will be moving onto further/higher education, apprenticeships or indeed employment. As a school, we wish them every success in the future and reassure them that their school will always be there for them if and when required.

The parent body within the school have been so supportive throughout this difficult time. The use of our ParentMail system has definitely improved the



communication between home and school. We are fortunate to have the unwavering support of the Parent Teachers' Association who continue to make such a significant contribution to the life and work of the school.

I am incredibly proud of the staff, who despite the challenges faced, continued to provide first-class education and teaching. I am so lucky to have the most amazing team who are passionate, talented and committed to providing our pupils with the very best education that can be provided by any school. They strive to be the best and care hugely for our pupils making a difference to each one of them. I want to say a very big thank you to each member of the team, Teaching and Non-Teaching who work so hard to keep the school-machine well oiled.

Again, we were unable to share and celebrate the achievements of our pupils by having our annual Prize Day. We did however, have Chelsie Kealey, former pupil and Downtown Radio presenter as our guest speaker who provided an inspirational message to our pupils which was shared in our digital Prize Day booklet. Our pupils continue to excel in their GCSE and CSE outcomes. 97% of our pupils achieved five or more GCSE passes at A*-C grades, this is 17.3% above the Northern Ireland Average for like schools. 88% of pupils also achieved seven or more GCSE passes at A*-C grades. 55% achieving 5 or more GCSE passes at A*-C grades including English and Mathematics.

Some notable results included Madison Duff who achieved 3A*s, 4As and 2Bs. Anna Connell achieved 3A*s, 3As and 3Bs, Jason Curry who achieved 2A*s, 3As and 4Bs, Cealeagh Cruise achieved 2A*s, 1A and Natalie Parkhill 6Bs and 2A*s, 1A and 6Bs.

At A level the cohort excelled themselves with the best set of results achieved in a long time with 88% achieving 3A*-C grades which is 29.2% above the Northern Ireland Average for like schools. Some notable results included Jacob Coyle who achieved 2A*s and 1A. Joshua Campbell achieved 3 Distinction*s, Jessica Murry and Stuart McCracken 2As and a Distinction*, Annie-Mae Little 2As and a Distinction, Katelyn MacNichol 2 Distinction*s and a Distinction, Megan McLaughlin 2As and a Distinction* and Ciarra O'Hara 2 Distinction*s and 1A.

There have been many highlights throughout the year but the Cash For Kids campaign, which took place between 27th September to 22nd October 2021, really did capture the imagination and showcased what Limavady High School is all about. It was truly amazing to witness first-hand how kindness and generosity became infectious with every form class getting involved. At the end of the fundraising window the Limavady High School family were able to raise an amazing £22,384.39. A special mention must go to Mr O'Neill's form class who raised over £900 and to Lucy Conley in Year 10 who raised an amazing £1500 during her online fitness class.

This academic year has been one when the school has been recognised not only at local level but at national level for the outstanding work which is going on in our school. On 23 September the school was recognised for its commitment to pastoral care at the UK National Awards for Pastoral Care (NAPCE) by winning Pastoral School of the Year. In March I had the pleasure of travelling with Miss Fisher, Mr Linton, Head Boy Steven and Head Girl Emily to Keele University in Manchester for the Be Kind Awards. The school won the UK School of Kindness Award. This award recognises the daily acts of kindness within the school and also how we, as a school, promote and encourage kindness via our Work Hard, Be Kind motto. On 26 May I had the pleasure of informing the staff that the school had achieved a Pearson National Teaching Silver Award

recognising our outstanding commitment to changing the lives of the children we work with every day. As a Silver Award winner, we have now been shortlisted to win one of just 16 Gold Awards later in the year. Recognition of this once in a lifetime achievement will be broadcast on the BBC's The One Show as part of a week-long celebration of teaching, which sees famous faces honour award winners every night in the run up to the ceremony. On 15 June I had the pleasure in joining Mrs Rosborough, Miss Gilfillan, Miss Quigg and Mr Dallas at the OCN Awards ceremony at the Titanic Hotel to witness Mr Dallas receiving his Inspiring Tutor/ Teacher of the Year award. All these awards recognise the commitment and dedication of the entire Limavady High School family and should be celebrated.

This year we saw the delivery of the first phase of the Shared Campus with the opening of the new state-of-the-art STEM centre. It has been fantastic to see how our pupils and the pupils from St Mary's, Limavady have enjoyed the new surroundings. This new facility has created a lot of interest not only from industry but from across the world as we continue to welcome visitors to see and hear first-hand how the Shared Education Programme works and why it is so successful. We are looking forward now to the delivery of the new study/common rooms for Careers, Drama, Media and Sixth Form pupils on the St Mary's site which is due for completion in May 2023.

At the end of each academic year, we get the opportunity to thank staff for their many years of service. This year is no exception and I want to thank Miss Fisher, Mr McFarland, Miss Richardson and Mr Quinn for their dedication and commitment to our pupils and school and wish them every success in the future

There is no doubt that the 2021/22 academic year was again a very challenging year for us all. I do believe however, that we should be proud of what we have achieved this year. The Limavady High School family has shown how we care, nurture, encourage and support one another which has helped us to face the adversity and deal with the challenges together.

Let's hope that the 2022/23 academic year will be much more settled, and that life and school will return to normal.


Miss Fisher

(Vice Principal —Pastoral Care)





Mr McFarland Head of Technology & Design

Mr McFarland, a former pupil and Head Boy of Limavady High School (1977-84), was appointed as Teacher of Design & Technology in September 2000 after 10 years being the Youth Tutor at Faughan Valley High School. When arriving at the school he immediately helped out at the Youth Club and also with the lighting and stage design for the schools shows. In 2003 he went on the WELB ski trip with Mrs McCartney before taking over the running of our annual ski trip in 2006 with up to 30 pupils each year experiencing the slopes of Switzerland, Italy, Bulgaria and France.

Mr McFarland has always been very passionate about providing all pupils under his care with opportunities to learn and develop new skills in a number of different environments. Holding qualifications in hill walking, open canoe, kayak, rock climbing, water safety and advanced first aid which led to his appointment as Teacher in Charge of Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme in 2002. This appointment was no real surprise as he always had been involved in the leadership and development of the scheme throughout his career and had held many roles such as being part of the NI Liaison Committee, and latterly, he was, selected as the Northern Ireland representative on the International Gold Award programme. He has led the development of this programme for many years and facilitated expeditions into the mountains, including a number of Gold Finals to Scotland and France before handing this position over in 2018.

Mr McFarland was responsible for First Aid at the school. This was a very challenging role; however, he took it in his stride and created an atmosphere of control and calm in very difficult and challenging situations. Building capacity within the school has always been a priority for him. He created a First Aid Team in the school made up of our students. At regional level he has been involved with the British Red Cross, recently helping to set up the North West Community First Responder Scheme and the Restart a Heart Day.

Mr McFarland was an excellent teacher of Technology and Design and his love of his subject was very evident in his approach to workshop activities and the design process. In 2005 he shared responsibility for the Leadership of the Technology and Design Department with a colleague prior to taking on the role himself in

2006. His support and commitment in the delivery of the new state-of-the-art STEM centre has been outstanding and he can now leave the profession knowing that the Technology and Design department is in a great place for the future.

His many years of dedication and service were recognised in 2019 when, on the celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday he was awarded a British Empire Medal (B.E.M) for services to education and community in Londonderry.

Mr Mornin commented, "Mr McFarland was a valued member of the Limavady High School family for the past 22 years; we all wish him many years of health and happiness in the future. I want to thank Alastair personally for his help and commitment during the delivery of the Shared STEM Centre."











After teaching in several schools, I came back to Limavady High School in September 2000. It has been great working in the school that did so much for me as a pupil and I hope I have contributed for others in a similar way.

With all my interests I have been as involved outside the classroom as in it. Why did Limavady High School implement Bedrock Vocabulary?

Our starting point always was to develop the literacy skills of our students and looking for unique ways to do that. We did some research and Bedrock just seemed to fit everything that we wanted as it encompasses completely the skills of vocabulary. It supports reading, it supports writing, it supports oracy and it's about independent learning as well.

The programme supports the teacher by giving them the framework and a structure but then it allows students to actually pace their own learning too.

How does it tie in with our whole school priorities?

We are a reading school. Reading is something that we promote and reading is continually developing students' vocabulary so I think it fits in with that. When it comes to reading, students struggle with not having a substantial vocabulary which prohibits their engagement with a text. A big focus in our school is developing knowledge and vocabulary is knowledge. So for our students learning more words, gives them access to greater depth in their learning. Bedrock allows that to happen, because vocabulary enrichment is a whole school curriculum, it's not just an English curriculum.

Bedrock supports our work in the areas of reading and oracy, but all of those things can only work if you've got the building blocks of the words and it's about making the links between lessons. The words the students use in Bedrock, are relevant to other topics and things that are going on in their classes around school.

Being able to communicate through the written and spoken word is such a strength. It gives you confidence and that's one of the things we can give our students; It's all down to words and being empowered by words!





NI's first shared educational campus partners with Sensata Technologies to engineer future prospects in Limavady

From September, Limavady High School and St Mary's Limavady will be joining forces to offer students the opportunity to study engineering at the schools' new £11 million technology facilities.

The schools will be partnering with industry to support the new qualification by launching a practical mentoring programme which will structure lessons around real-life examples of how engineers work and how they develop products.

In the cross-community launch event, students from Year 10 were introduced to engineering at the schools' joint building where Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (or STEM subjects for short) will be taught. Students had the opportunity to investigate some of the detailed engineering that is developed for Heavy Goods Vehicles and to talk to some of the engineers from Sensata Technologies that develop them.

Nathanael Murphy, Application Design Manager at Sensata Technologies, explains, "At Sensata, we develop sensor products that are used in the automotive and Heavy Goods Vehicle industries to make them safer. We do this by monitoring the tyre pressure which in turn can alert the driver or fleet managers if there is a problem."

"Like many engineering companies, we manufacture products that are used every day to make our lives easier or safer and yet most people never notice them unless there is a problem! We wanted to get involved with this initiative to open young peoples' eyes and minds to the opportunities that engineering presents and lift the bonnet – literally – on what it could do for them."

Mr D Mornin, Principal of Limavady High School, has been one of the driving forces behind the introduction of an Engineering GCSE, he said, "We want to inspire and prepare our students for the future and when we look at the job opportunities available in Northern Ireland at present, we know that there are real career prospects with this qualification.

"Students will be required to study mechanical, software and process engineering and we are lucky to be partnering with a local company like Sensata Technologies which builds all of these disciplines into its products. It is also valuable for students to see that products designed, engineered and manufactured in Northern Ireland are exported throughout the world."

The multi-million pound Shared STEM facilities which have been built on Irish Green Street provide easy access for both schools and a modern and practical





building for teaching practical subjects like engineering. Speaking on that subject, Mrs R Moore, Principal at St Mary's Limavady, said, "We have been working together for many years to offer our students improved facilities and are delighted to be opening the building soon. This new space offers our students the opportunity to learn together and the space to take engineering ideas from concept to creation – via lots of different prototypes of course!"

The Shared STEM facilities opened officially on 21 February and students will start the GCSE Engineering course from September 2022.











Over the last 14 months, Mr Quigley worked with Karl Porter from UV Arts, a Street Art company based locally, to organise the transformation of a large area of wall in the main playground. They began with a small group of Year 10 pupils last year to develop ideas for the walls. 



JOUNG ENTERPRISE

Once again we have had another successful year in partnership with Young Enterprise offering a wide range of enterprise programmes across all year groups in school. Year 8 had the opportunity to complete the Step-Up programme face to face in September – we had smaller groups than normal but pupils had the opportunity to develop skills and positive attitudes as they make the leap from primary to post primary school.

Year 9 pupils took part in the Blast Off programme in May where they learnt through teamwork what it means to be enterprising and discover what it an entrepreneur. It was great to see the programme being delivered face to face in the assembly hall.

Year 10 got a taster for Business when they were involved in the Project Business programme, they were able to take on the role of a small business owner and test their skills and qualities in this field. Year 10 pupils also took part in the Causeway Coast and Glens Digital Technology programme where once again in teams the pupils had to solve a problem using technology. We had two groups who achieved success - Elderly Impact designed a vest suitable for an elderly person to wear. Its purpose was to protect the person from a fall or injury and also a family member will be notified if pressure pads were pressed potentially raising an alarm that something might be wrong. The unique part of this design was that the person no longer needed to be able to press a button to raise the alarm for help.

Petbitt designed a collar which monitored the pets heart rate, water intake and steps taken and it also had a tracker to find it if it got lost using GPS. This is really a Fitbit for a pet it helps pet owners identify quickly if their pet is unwell – it also encourages pet owners to walk and increase their own steps. Year 11 completed the Learn to Earn programme digitally with their form tutors on a Friday morning during PD again giving pupils the insight into career choices, personal skills, recruitment and the cost of living to help young people prepare for successful futures.

STEMactivities



What an amazing achievement Mrs McCartney, we are all very proud of you.







THE WOLFHOUND 2022

Limavady High School have a strong History running the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. This scheme has been and will continue to be the biggest club in the school, with over one hundred pupils signed up each year.

Why do we run the award scheme?

'We are here to empower young people; to support them as they learn new skills, overcome obstacles, and build confidence and resilience. We are here for the challenges, the frustrations, the triumphs and the laughter. We are here because we believe in youth without limits.'

At the beginning of the year, Mr. S. Young handed the reigns over to Mr. A. Linton to run the scheme. With the expert help and guidance from Mr. S. Young and the knowledgeable Mr. A. McFarland, Mr. A. Linton began running the scheme from September.

The global pandemic had left the scheme in disorder, with students back logged for two years due to lockdowns and restrictions. Various year groups had a two-year delay on completing the expeditions as well as the other key aspects of the scheme which include volunteering, physical and skills sections. The current Year 12's had to finish the expedition for Bronze and Silver practice which by this stage they had signed up for. The three staff members combined formed a plan to get everyone through, regardless of the difficulty of the situation.

Since September 2021, Bronze, Silver and Gold groups met and began training leading to their expeditions, which began in April 2022. Between April 2022 and June 2022, five expeditions ran. This included a Bronze final, Silver practice and Silver finals, and a Gold practice and final. All expeditions ran successfully and were completed by teams of outstanding pupils.

In 2020, young people stepped up and played an integral role in supporting communities across the UK to respond to the coronavirus pandemic. A remarkable 330,000 young people continued with their DofE activities – a huge force for good, dedicating 1.8 million hours of volunteering, equating to an investment of almost $\mathfrak{L}8.5$ million, to local communities at a time when they needed it most. DofE participants sewed PPE at their kitchen tables, delivered food parcels to those who needed them and put on virtual concerts for care homes.

As the UK recovers, the benefits that the DofE offers are more important than ever. Our new strategy puts the DofE at the heart of the national effort to back young people through the challenging years ahead.

This scheme would not run in Limavady High School without the dedicated staff and volunteers who give their free time to ensure the kids are trained to and complete the expedition phase.


